### 1849

<u>29 October</u> -- Charles C. Rich was the first Mormon known to take note of the iron deposits along the Old Spanish Trail. Rich recorded in his journal, "after traveling 8 miles came to a good spring at the point of a mountain in the south end of the Valley, 6 miles further came to Little Muddy [or "Coal Creek," the future site of Cedar City] a good sized creek, plenty timber & grass 8 miles further where we came to some springs [Iron Springs]. [H]ere we found iron ore."<sup>7</sup>

<u>24 November</u> -- 47 men, traveling with 12 wagons, 24 yoke of oxen, 38 horses and mules, a brass cannon and food for about three months left Salt Lake Valley.<sup>8</sup> <u>Fall</u> - Apostle Parley P. Pratt led a party of 50 men to explore the surrounding area that was Utah's first southern white settlement. The exploring party found iron ore and coal in the valley of the Little Salt Lake. Settlement was suggested along "Center Creek"

<u>25 December</u> -- The exploring party has a president (David Fullmer) voted to preside over part of the camp which remained with the wagons. They stay at Red Creek. [Paragonah] A captain and a clerk are called as well.

<u>928 December</u> -- It is apparent that the exploring company had split. [Parley P. Pratt leads one group south to the Virgin River, while the other half stays around Parowan.]

### 1850

<u>8 January</u> -- Apostle Parley P. Pratt raised a liberty pole above Heap's Spring and dedicated the future site of "The City of Little Salt Lake"

<u>31 January</u> -- Iron County was established as a county of the State of Deseret.<sup>10</sup> <u>27 July</u> -- In the LDS newspaper, Deseret News, 50 men of talent and skill were asked to volunteer to colonize and help to open the mines by the Presidency of the Church. They were being asked to forsake their wives and children for one year, but they were promised that they would receive an hundredfold for their sacrifice. Little interest was shown and so church leaders resorted to calling Saints on one-year "callings" to the Iron County Mission.

<u>26 October</u> -- George A. Smith analyzed needed manpower and logistical skills and issuing calls to qualified men. The Seventies met in the Bowery on Temple Square. George A. Smith called 100 men by name to join the proposed 12-month mission to southern Utah

<u>16 November</u> -- Those George A. Smith called were listed in the *Deseret News* with another plea for more volunteers.

Brother Geo. A. Smith the president of the mission to L.S. Lake calls for 50 volunteers, and it is right ... that brethren who can, should respond to the call, and not press him, in the multitude of his cares, to run about the country to pick them up. Some of the brethren may have a delicacy in volunteering their services, and would say "I am ready to go if I have a call, but I don't like to volunteer; if the president wants me he will lay his hand on me and I am ready to go." Just right, brethren, exactly right; fifty of you not advertised in this paper, who can go (and you could all go if a mob were at your heels,) come forward and volunteer, for you not only have a call but the president's hand is on you, and you are wanted. The mission is an important one, as thousands of the saints will be ready to testify when they have spent a few years in the mountains without a stove to cook by, or keep themselves warm; a kettle to boil soap in; or a mill to grind their wheat, because there was no castings or iron by which it might be constructed. No mob is wanting to fill such a glorious mission, warm hearts will stimulate the whole. Come brethren, volunteer, and get ready."

<u>3 December</u> -- the Deseret General Assembly created Iron County. 11

<u>15 December</u> --Apostle George A. Smith and the colonizing company left Provo and began their journey south. He named the camp the "Iron County Mission" and declared that they were "as much on a mission as though we were sent to Preach the Gospel." Smith appointed Elisha H. Groves as a superintending bishop to mediate any differences that should arise in camp. Other bishops with their counselors had been called to "Preside in meetings & to administer the Sacrament & to be like fathers to the camp." Henry Lunt was called to act as Apostle Smith's "private clerk" and John D. Lee was called to be the "general clerk of the camp." The wagon train was divided into two companies of 50 or so each.

### 1851

"And George A. Smith an apostle, who founded the city of Parowan, and presided over the stake until the fall of 1851..."

Initial Name of Settlement/Fort -- Louisa, in honor of an early Mormon Woman<sup>12</sup>

13 January -- Pioneers under the direction of Apostle George A. Smith ended their journey at the mouth of Parowan Canyon (Center Creek).<sup>13</sup>

<u>16 January</u> -- Iron County was organized and Capt. Jefferson Hunt was elected to represent them in the legislature of the State of Deseret. <sup>14</sup>

<u>9 February</u> -- "The general meeting held in the Bowery in L. S. L. City." George A. Smith mentions "Iron County Mission...I have a name for this place, it is a Ladies name and it is Louisa," sustained. Organized into "**Louisa Branch**," President George A. Smith, James Lewis, clerk, Elisha Groves bishops for each ward: Anson Call, first ward, Tarlton Lewis, second ward, D. A. Miller, third ward, and Joseph L. Robinson, fourth ward. All priesthood collected under a quorum of elders, pres. E.H. Groves.

W.H. Dame mapped the fort, showing the cabins against the south wall as the 1st Ward, west as the 2nd Ward, north as the 3rd Ward, east as the 4th Ward.

<u>2 March</u> -- 11am meeting held in the Bowery in LSL City. Bishops Anson Call and Joseph L. Robinson are called as counselors of the Elder's Quorum that is located in Louisa [Parowan]. (It should be noted that these two men were called as bishops on Feb. 9th to the 1st and 4th wards, respectively, in Louisa.)

<u>April/May</u> -- A council house was constructed from the 1,500 logs that had been hauled from the canyon. The council house served as the church, schoolhouse, theater and dance hall.

May 7: after finding good supplies of coal in [70 Canyon], George A. Smith locates a site for a city [Cedar City]<sup>16</sup>

May 13: Brigham Young visits the saints at "Cedar City" but says the name of the city should be Parowan. <sup>17</sup> Was Parowan being called Cedar City at that time?

May 16: city government of Parowan (changed from Louisa) organized under the direction of visiting Brigham Young. 18 Also visits "Cedar City."

<u>25 May</u> -- Parowan John C. L. Smith was chosen by unanimous vote to act at [sic] Bishop in the place of Bishop Miller, bishop of the 3rd Ward.<sup>19</sup>

Summer/Fall: Joel Hills Johnson establishes a ranch at Johnson's Springs [Enoch]<sup>20</sup>

17 August -- Conference held in Parowan where "Tarlton Lewis serve as [presiding]

Bishop to take charge of the tithing." A clerk to the bishop was also called, Pres. George

A. Smith wished to resign his office as President of the Parowan branch. Motion...resolved that we feel satisfied with all the acts and doings of Pres. George A. Smith as President of the Iron county mission...Elijah H. Groves be the President of the **Parowan branch**."<sup>21</sup>

October 1: At General Conference, George A. Smith proposes to the Twelve that on advice from John D. Lee, a settlement be started at the junction of the Rio Virgen and Santa Clara [St. George] and another in the Coal Creek Valley [Cedar City]. The Conference proposes to send three companies, one led by Peter Shirts, second by John A. Woolf, third by Andrew Love<sup>22</sup>

Oct 28: Brigham Young writes from Fillmore to "the presidency of Parowan," instructing Pres. Groves to call John L. Smith and Mathew Carruthers as his counselors, suggesting that Groves' calling is permanent. Also mentions that John D. Lee is on his way with a company of settlers bound for the Virgin River (although they will stop at Harmony).<sup>23</sup> Unclear if Carruthers move to Cedar and leadership thereof is intentional at this point.

November: Joel H. Johnson is settling at Elkhorn Springs [Enoch] [MH]

November 3: George A. Smith (now visiting) and W.H. Dame survey a site for a fort and town on Coal Creek [Cedar City]<sup>24</sup>

Nov 5: George A. Smith writes the Deseret News, mentions preparations for building on Coal Creek [Cedar City], Red Creek [Paragonah], and Joel Johnson at the Springs 10 miles from Parowan [Enoch]<sup>25</sup>

<u>Nov 10</u> -- Cedar City was settled by a company under the command of Captain/President Henry Lunt, who came from Salt Lake Valley for the purpose of starting indian work.<sup>26</sup>

Feb 2: Matthew Carruthers calls a meeting in Coal Creek/Cedar City. "Proposed that Henry Lunt be his first councillor & John Casto 2nd." Suggests that Carruthers is functioning both as stake counselor and Cedar presiding elder; subsequent journal entries confirm this.

April: Church statistical report is missing any report from Iron County<sup>28</sup>

Spring: Paragoonah settled [MH]

Spring: Peter Shirts settles in the Hamilton/Shirts Creek area [Hamilton MH]

12 May: "Parowan and Cedar Cities were organized into one Stake of Zion. Also a Presidency over the same, John Calvin L. Smith President, John Steel 1st Councillor, Henry Lunt 2nd Councillor. . . A high council was also organized. Philip Smith was ordained bishop for Cedar City." <sup>29</sup>

12 May: "We [Brigham Young and other apostles] met today to organize the High Council and presidency of the **stake at Parowan**. John L. Smith was appointed President of the Stake, John Steel 1st Henry Lunt 2nd Councelors. E.H. Groves, M. Carruthers, N. Harmons, Joseph Chatterly, H. Graham, JA Little, Wm H. Dame, John D. Lee, Samuel West, Elijah Newman, Francis T. Whitney, Joel H. Johnson, High Council. Philip Klingen [Chicken?] Smith bishop of **Cedar City**, Tarleton Lewis Bishop of **Parowan**. The above were ordained under the hands of O. Pratt, W. Woodruff, & G.A. Smith." mp:700317

October 6: Statistical Report lists Parowan, Bishop Tarleton Lewis, 660 members<sup>31</sup>

22 October: G.A. Smith returns to temporarily preside<sup>32</sup>

28 October: Smith lays out Cedar City, including temple square.

7 November: Smith visits John D. Lee's new settlement, Fort Harmony. 33

19 November: Smith returns

December 31: Bishops' statistical report of wards and bishops (which may also include branches) lists Parowan with Tarleton Lewis.<sup>34</sup>

Dec: Paragonah has about 20 families, presided by Willam H. Dame [MH], Johnson's Springs has 7 families [MH], PE Joel H. Johnson?

April 3: List of members and wards in Utah (28 December 1852) includes an addendum for "the Branch at Parowan," "Brethren at Paragoonah," and "Cedar City." <sup>35</sup>

April 9: General Bishops meeting includes Bishop Philip K. Smith from Coal Creek<sup>36</sup>

July: Shirts Creek (Hamilton) abandoned [MH]

Sep 10: Stake Conference.<sup>37 mp 700318</sup> Sustainings not itemized, but mentions President JCL Smith, counselors, high council, and lists stats for the wards

- Parowan Ward, Bishop Tarlton Lewis, 335 residents
- Cedar Ward, Bishop Philip K. Smith, 455 residents
- "Total for this branch," 490

October 6: Report of General Conference includes a list of "wards" with "bishops" (this may be a generalization and could include some branches with presidents), including **Parowan** with Tarleton Lewis and **Cedar** with Philip Klinginsmith. 38 mp:800205

Oct 8: General bishops meeting includes Bishop Klinginsmith from Cedar City Ward<sup>39</sup> October: Directory of local leaders in Utah Territory lists the following for Iron County. Parowan City: John C.L. Smith, President of the Stake (with counselors); Phillip Klinginsmith, Bishop (with counselors), also a high council, patriarch. H. Lunt, President of **Cedar Branch**. 40 mp:700323 20 November --Conference was held at Cedar City, Iron County. Members of the twelve present during the proceedings: Erastus Snow and Franklin D. Richards. Presidents of the Stake, J. C. L. Smith, John Steele, and H. Lunt. Decided to settle the herd ground at Summit Creek, led by Silas Smith. 41

May 31: List of wards south of GSL City, with bishops, counselors, and clerk (and several measures of development, like the size of the fort, schools, and whether shade trees have been planted). It is clear that by this time, wards are the default type of congregation. Includes Parowan (Bishop Tarleton Lewis), Cedar (Bishop Philip Klinginsmith), Harmony (also Klinginsmith?)<sup>42</sup> Separate unit reports list all members, including Horace B. Owens as President of Harmony.

Sept 17: Stake Conference. 43 mp:700324

- John C.L. Smith, president of the Stake of Zion in Iron County, counselor John Steele, high council, patriarch
- Tarlton Lewis, bishop of Parowan with counselors; Philip K. Smith, bishop of Cedar;

Wm Reese Davis ordained bishop of Harmony, IC Haight as president of "Cedar Stake of Zion." <a href="https://example.com/21 May">21 May</a> -- Meeting in Parowan. <sup>48</sup> New high councilors called to replace those gone to Cedar, and John Steele (Pres. counselor) called to Las Vegas. *Also? Pres. J.C.L. Smith chose James Henry Martineau and Jesse Nathanial Smith as his counselors with the advice and sanction of the First Presidency*.

"At a meeting of the 18th \_\_\_\_\_ (the day of Brigham's arrival) the following men were voted to fill the vacant seats in the high council: - Samuel Gould, Elijah Elmer, Priddy Meeks, Horao M. Alexander, Job P. Hall, and Charles Hall. And they were subsequently ordained and set apart. In the afternoon, the meeting was recessed into a special conference by vote, and Pres. Smith presented James H. Martineau and Jesse N. Smith as his council, and they were sustained by a unanimous vote: he also nominated J. H. Martineau as the recorder and recorder of the stake, seconded and carried unanimously."

"Pres. Smith then proposed to set apart some of the sisters of Israel to the sick and instruct the females in their various duties and in the principles of that organization. And on motion mother Mary Smith, Sarah Meeks, Margaret West, and Hanna Fish were voted to act as mothers of Israel."

"In the evening the sisters were blessed and set apart under the hands of the presidency to fill their callings, and (Tom) (Whitney) a (Pah-ed) \text{^\*} who had recently been appointed chief of the Pah-co's around Parowan, was also blessed and set apart for that office. And many blessings were pronounced upon their heads, which they subsequently said they realized."

<u>9 September</u> --Special Conference held at Parowan.<sup>49</sup> "Today, on motion of Pres. J.C.L. Smith the afternoon meeting was (recessed) into a special conference, for business matters. The authorities of the church were (presented) by Pres. J. N. Smith and unanimously sustained. Also the following authorities of this stake, as follows:

Presidency, John Calvin Lazelle Smith, and James Henry Martineau and Jesse Nathaniel Smith councilors

Bishopric, Tarlton Lewis, Bishop, and Calvin (Crane) Pendleton and Orson (Bennet?) Adams Councilors

October 6: Statistical report lists "wards" with "bishops," including Parowan: T Lewis, Cedar: P K'Smith, Fort Harmony: WR Davies.<sup>50</sup>

- <u>28 October</u> -- According to the counsel of the First Presidency of the church, four high priests were appointed to go with the teachers, to teach the people. Their name are -- Samuel West, H.M. Alexander, F.T. Whitney, and E. Elmer
- <u>3 November</u> -- Pres. J.C.L. Smith said that there ought to be a book kept in \_\_\_\_ which should be recorded, all things of consequence whether spoken on the stand or the....<sup>52</sup> <u>November 22</u> -- Pres. J.C.L. Smith was quite sick in Fillmore. He was there attending the district court for the case of S. G. Baker and his wife with Bishop T. Lewis and others.
- <u>4 December</u> -- Pres. J.C.L. Smith, J.H. Martineau, Bishop T. Lewis, C.C. Pendleton and others arrived at Parowan from Filmore, the Court having adjourned for the present. <u>December</u> -- Pres. Smith (improved) (notably) on the way home. But after he came to Parowan, the brethren came so frequently to see him that he became \_\_\_\_\_ and took a relapse. By which he was (brought) (very) (low). During his sickness, the care of the stake (fell) upon Elder J. H. Martineau, his first counsellor, who was deprived of the assistance of Pres. J. N. Smith in account of his absence to Filmore to attend the legislature.
- <u>22 December</u> -- Bro. Wallace, as one of the presidency of the quorum of high priests, organized the high priests in the stake into a quorum. And on motion of Pres. Martineau Pres. J.C.L. Smith was appointed to preside over them, with directions to report quarterly to head-quarters, he exhorted the high priests to be diligent in teaching the

saints their duties, and in learning their own duties: that they ought to take the lead in good works, in beautifying the houses and premises, in taking wives, and in being active in their duties.<sup>53</sup>

<u>30 December</u> -- Pres. J.C.L. Smith was taken much worst and sent for his first counciler, Pres. J. H. Martineau, who came and laid hands on him with other brethren. Twenty minutes to eleven o'clock p.m. He breathed his last, and departed to do a higher and more extended work in another sphere. Those who were present at his death were his first counciler, J. H. Martineau (J.N. Smith, his other one being at the legislature at Filmore), Bros. C.C. Pendelton and P. Meek and A. Smith, J. (Lo) and "Black John" and his bro. -in-law E. W. \_\_\_\_\_. Bishop T. Lewis also assisted to lay him out. 30 December: When Pres. JCL Smith dies, "Bishop Tarleton Lewis assumed the Presidency of the Stake of Parowan."

#### 1856

Is Amasa M. Lyman or George A. Smith living here? They seem to always be around. However, they appear to only be frequent visitors, possibly with some kind of assignment over this area.

1 January -- Elder J.H. Martineau made some remarks on the order of the kingdom and said that according to order the presidency of the descended on Bishop Tarlton Lewis, and exhorted all the Brethren to sustain him in his office and calling.

Bishop Lewis rose and said that he felt (befitting) about taking that charge of (affairs), but that it was his duty and that he would try to do his best in that office, and desired the support of all the members of the stake.

<u>20 January</u> -- G. A. Smith (in town to settle the estate of JCL Smith) reports that Brigham Young desires **William H. Dame to be the new Stake President**; he is sustained and ordained<sup>55</sup>

Jan 24: Pres. Dame chooses counselors

March 14: Pres. Dame issues some instructions for the new settlement at Beaver after some indian troubles. "The Presidency of Parowan had no desire to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction of the new settlement at Beaver, but as Loren Babbitt, the president, had not yet arrived with his company, it was thought that trifling technicalities

8 October: Edward Hunter and counselors rebaptize and reconfirm several bishops,<sup>59</sup> including:

- Isaac C. Haight, President of Iron County[??]
- W'm Horne Dame, President of the stake of Parowan, Iron County

#### 1857

Jan 30: Tarleton Lewis writes BY: "I learn by our brethren that the twelve requested all Prest. And Bishops to go to you and give up their office and appointment, ... I present myself, with my office, at your feet, requesting you to deal with me as you choose." Feb 13: BY responds to Tarleton Lewis's offer to resign, asking him to continue. 61

Spring: Silas S. Smith moves to Paragonah, eventually Bishop<sup>62</sup> Spring: William Dalley new PE of Elkhorn Springs [Enoch] [MH]

August 15: traveling authorities visit John Hamilton at "Sidon" (Hamilton) between Cedar and Harmony.<sup>63</sup>

Sept 7 1857: Mountain Meadows Massacre. Pres. Dame and other Parowan leaders appear to have had some involvement, but Cedar City and Harmony leaders have the most direct involvement.

March: some intrigue in the stake; a keg of beer was stolen, and it appears that Bishop Tarlton Lewis was covering for his son. Many of the leaders, including his counselors, turn against him. It is likely that he moved to Minersville soon after this.<sup>71</sup>

July 29: Cedar Stake disorganized by George A. Smith, Henry Lunt ordained Bishop of Cedar Ward<sup>72</sup> Isaac C. Haight, Philip Klinginsmith and others implicated in the Mountain Meadows Massacre are in hiding.

August: additions to the plats of Parowan and Paragonah are surveyed<sup>73</sup>

Nov 7: BY writes "Bp. Tarlton Lewis having removed from Parowan, the brethren there are counselled to select a suitable person to fill his place, and Bros. Lyman and Rich will

20 Nov: "Wm S. Warren was ordained bishop of Parowan under the hands of Amasa Lyman and Charles C. Rich" 75

<u>26 November</u> -- "Today Br. Rich addressed the people upon the general principles of the Kingdom. Br. Amasa Lyman spoke in regard to appointing officers for this stake. He wished to know if the Apostles, by virtue of their ordination and calling in this church and their experience, should not and do not know more than other members of the Church; also whose prerogative it is to nominate or appoint Presidents. Bishops or Councillors and other church officers, whether it belongs to the people or to the Apostleship.

"He presented the name of **William S. Warren for Bishop of this stake** and requested all to vote freely either one way or another."

"Br. Warren was sustained by a majority of the congregation." 76

<u>27 November</u> -- Orson B. Adams was set apart as 1st Counselor to the Bishop, and Daniel Page 2nd Councilor under the Hands of Elders Amasa Lyman & C.C. Rich"

"And John Steele and Daniel P. Clark were set apart as High Councilors to fill the vacancy occasioned by the calling of W. H. Dame to the Presidency of the Stake, and the removal of Elijah Elmer."<sup>77</sup>

28 Nov: William S. Warren ordained bishop of **Parowan** by Amasa Lyman and Charles C. Rich<sup>78</sup>

<u>4 December</u> -- "Today was held the Quarterly Conference of the seventies of this stake and Cedar. Jehiel McConnell and W. Adams spoke much on the necessity of preserving our grain and preparing for a time of famine."

17 December: Ward Conference at Cedar. <sup>79</sup> Speakers include Bishop Lunt, President WH Dame of Parowan, Bishop Farnsworth of Beaver, and Isaac C. Haight. Sustain "Henry Lunt as President and Bishop of Cedar City," but sustainings don't include Dame or other Parowan leaders.

Elkhorn Springs [Enoch] PE William Dalley moves to Summit, branch disorganized with only two families remaining [MH]

Some sources say that John Hamilton was called to preside at Hamilton Fort this year [MH]

had never been sanctioned by the people, neither did he want the presidency until he was the unanimous choice of the people." He is immediately sustained as branch president.88

Construction began on a large church building at the center of the public square, later known as the "Old Rock Church." 89

### 1862

January: When Ft. Harmony is washed out by the great flood, they are visited by "Bishop Lunt, I.C. Haight, and John M. Higbee." Also mentions Kanarraville.<sup>90</sup>

Jan 8: BY's office writes to "Bishop Lunt, Cedar City" and "Ex-Bishop Davis, Harmony." Davis is to hand over all ward property to Cedar Bishop Lunt, and that the ward records be forwarded to Bishop Willis of Toquerville. Why different bishops? Hereafter, it seems to be dependent on Cedar. ``1

February: I.C. Haight and Henry Lunt attending High Priest quorum meetings in Parowan, but apparently not enrolled members. <sup>92</sup> So is Cedar part of Southern Utah Mission or Parowan Stake? The latter makes a lot more sense.

February 23, March 2: Bishop Lunt visits Kanarra and Pinto Creek.<sup>93</sup> Suggests that they are dependent branches of Cedar Ward

April 7: General bishops meeting includes bishops of Parowan and Cedar wards<sup>94</sup>

Nov 15: Southern Utah Mission Conference sustains Henry Lunt, B Cedar Ward ("Harmony, Pinto, and Kanarra included in this ward")<sup>95</sup> <sub>mp:700312</sub>

October 6: General Bishops Meeting includes the bishops of Parowan and Cedar City Wards<sup>96</sup>

Mar 5: "The people of the [Harmony] Branch were called together by Bishop Lunt [Cedar Ward] for the purpose of settling their difficulties, resulting in a better state of feeling. Pres't Lee tendered his resignation as president of the branch which was accepted." James H. Imlay sustained as PE, set apart by Bishop Lunt. 97 So clearly Harmony is a dependent branch of Cedar at this point; records mention more official visits of Bishop Lunt in subsequent months.

10 September -- President Brigham Young sermonized to Parowan church members during his Trip to the Southern Settlements. He counseled that everyone should continue to learn even outside of school.98

Nov 4: at Conference of Southern Mission in St. George, Cedar Ward and Harmony Branch are listed again, as well as Kanarra Branch, PE Elisha H. Groves 99 mp:700296

Jan 31: BY writes to "President Wm H Dame and Bishops Wm S Warren and Henry Lunt" 100 May 4: Cedar Ward is represented at Southern Mission conference in St. George, Bishop Henry Lunt, mentions unnamed dependent branches of Cedar Ward (prob. Kanarra and Harmony). 101 mp:700274

Sep 23: BY writes William H. Dame, "You are hereby authorized and directed to take sole charge of the tithing office of this place, ... and preside over the entire Ward, henceforward as its bishop." 102

Nov 3: Conference at St. George doesn't list general sustainings, but Harmony Branch is reported by Pres. J. Imlay. 103

Construction completed on the "Old Rock Church" in Parowan. It served as a place of worship, town council hall, social hall, and tourist camp.<sup>107</sup>

Aug 20: "The Branch was this day visited by Prest. Erastus Snow...[he] asked the congregation if they desired to become a separate ward." Motion to do so carried, and a few men are nominated as bishop. Snow calls Wilson D. Pace as bishop of the "Harmony Ward" and he is sustained and ordained by Erastus Snow. This suggests that Harmony was under Snow's Southern Mission jurisdiction, not the Parowan Stake

June 4: "Bro. Geo. W. Sevy having been called upon a mission to preside over the settlement forming at Panguich, Iron Co.." Harmony Bishop Pace calls a new counselor. <sup>117</sup> Edward Davis, PE Summit Branch

May 4: At a Southern Mission Conference, Erastus Snow gives a talk about stake jurisdiction. "There were no specific boundaries defined between this stake and the adjoining stake north; for instance, a case of appeal from the Bishop's Court of Cedar City, might be carried to the High Council of St. George, or the High Council at Parowan, as might be most advisable, under the circumstances." !!!!!!<sup>118</sup>
